

# Archaeological Collections Seminar at 2010 Meetings

A seminar at the 2010 Meeting of the Alaska Anthropological Association will examine current issues with archaeological collections. The Archaeological Collections Seminar will consist of a few presentations, general discussion, and possibly a handson lab focusing on labeling and packaging methods. Topics of discussion include, but are not limited to:

- 1. common problems with incoming collections that museums encounter and potential solutions to these problems;
- 2. differences between proper curation supplies and substandard ones (i.e. white-out and fingernail polish);
- 3. museums and repositories in Alaska;
- 4. addressing artifact and sample collection in research designs; and
- 5. faunal collections and curation (this will be coordinated with the curation discussions at the zooarchaeology sessions).

The date and time for the seminar are not finalized yet. There will be no sign up fees and registration will not be required to attend the Archaeological Collections Seminar. # Biographies for Board Nominees

# Joan Dale (Current Board Member)

I have been working in archaeology for the past 28 years, starting as a field assistant on a salvage excavation at Fisherman Lake in the Northwest Territories, Canada. I received my MA in Anthropology from the University of Alaska Fairbanks in 1980, and most of my experiences have been in CRM. Since May 1987, I have worked for the Office of History and Archaeology. Many of you may know me as the keeper of the Alaska Heritage Resources Survey (AHRS). I have seen the changing nature of archaeological work in Alaska from a more research oriented focus to a more CRM focus. I am active in public outreach, and was one of the founding members of the aaa Public Education Group. Public outreach, one of the main missions of the aaa, needs to be brought to the forefront by the organization. I have experience in working with non-profits and have served as Secretary and President of Willow Crest Elementary PTA.

# **Karlene Leeper (Current Board Member)**

I am currently employed with the US Air Force, 611th Air Support Group (611 ASG) as an archaeologist and cultural resources manager. The 611 ASG manages remote radar stations and air stations throughout the state of Alaska. I previously worked as an archaeologist for the National Park Service throughout the parks and preserves of Alaska. Having been so lucky to work in virtually all parts of the state, I am a genuine geographic generalist. I was schooled in the northeastern United States, where I earned a MA in Anthropology at Binghamton University. Because I have been active in many regions and many communities, I have always encouraged local residents to record and preserve histories of their own localities and memories.
